Mother Nature was on her best behavior and everyone benefited.


Our new race headquarters and event venue at the Waterfront Brewery was not only well received, it also represents a vast

Southern Station - On The Water

Key West, FL - The 2017 STC Key West Race Week turned out to be an incredible sailing experience. The week was blessed with a great new venue, the Waterfront Brewery, spectacular weather, tight competition, with daily lead changes, and support from our sponsors.

Most of our STC Southern Station members were part of the Division 2 Race Circle, inclusive of the C&C 30s and the J-70s. The expectations were high, calling for 12 races over the 5 day schedule. Days 1 and 2 were a challenge with strong winds and big seas. Lots of fun for the RC boats working their way to the start. Nothing like your Mako 23 being launched completely out of the water on several occasions! The sea state was really rough with very lumpy seas with a short wave

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duration. In spite of the rough conditions, the RC, headed by PRO David Brennan, got 6 races in over those 2 days.

Day 3 saw a somewhat moderation of the wind, with a still sloppy sea, off of beautiful Key West. The RC got another 3 races in, giving the racers 9 races in 3 days. Day 4 began with a 2 hour postponement to see if the wind would fill in. The patience of the Race Officer and his team were rewarded with 2 full races beginning at 2 PM in quite favorable sailing conditions.

The RC now had 11 races in. Day 5 called for the 12th and final race. The wind was barely adequate to avoid a postpone on shore. PRO Brennan sent *Alligator Boots* out to the course for the real time actual conditions and the "go" was given for the fleet to leave the dock.

The last race was started on time with barely sailable conditions of 5-8 knots out of the South. The full slate of 12 races was completed, much to the delight of the boat owners and crew.

The Southern Station was most honored to be a big part of QKWRW 2017. Under the leadership of Race Chairman, John Fisher and On-The-Water Chairman, Dick Neville, Quantum Key West Race Week 2017 was indeed a perfect sailor's dream. They are to be commended for their tireless efforts, as is Bill Canfield, on site since October, to insure the regatta's success. Warrior Won's Two-Year Campaign To Win The 2016 Newport-Bermuda Race And NORT

The Day of the Start

The weather jitters that had been building since the Skippers' meeting the day before were now peaking.



Some boats had withdrawn overnight and rumors of more withdrawing were rippling through Newport. We met our professional weather consultants and their assessment was we'd "enjoy" 45-50 knots near the Gulf Stream. But before that the high pressure system over New England would dictate light winds for the first 24 hours. They recommended we get south as fast as possible to escape the high and then sail west of rhumb to catch the southerly flow of the cold ring south of the Gulf Stream.

I think race meteorologists will - properly always err on the side of caution given previous offshore racing disasters. We believed the forecasts, but H.L. taught me "All forecasts are wrong. It's just a question of how wrong." We always planned to start but we thought about it and decided we needed an additional experienced driver. So, At the 11th hour, we waived in H.L.'s lifelong friend and fellow STC member Carter Holliday. As we castoff our dock lines, I had a feeling that two years of boat preparation and crew work were about to pay off. We had the technology to keep tabs on the storm's progress, we had an experienced crew, and so I was confident we could avoid trouble or deal with it. Safety was my first priority, but the more optimistic view of the forecast sounded like the making of an epic blue water adventure.

The Race



After the start we headed south. The breeze became light as the sun set. We were under spinnaker and getting lifted to where the weather pros wanted us to go. But 16 hours into the race H.L. made the call to gybe away despite leading our class. The breeze was light ahead and he didn't want to sail the distance to get to the west side of the cold ring. It was too far and if we could get east and around the northerly flow of the ring we'd benefit. We gybed and crossed sterns. After 13 miles we found fresher breeze and gybed back. We had a comfortable crossing of the stream and pretty much pointed it at the "rock". H.L. finally got some sleep.

In 2014 H.L. gave me some distance racing advice "It's simple", he'd say "Always have the right sails up. Always go the right way". We went the right way. It was hours before we revealed to the crew our good fortune. We wanted to keep pushing. The next 450 miles were a dream come true: broad reaching at speeds of up to 18-19 knots in 6' - 8' seas, with dolphin and whales under blue skies, reeling in the few boats ahead of us one by one.

Near the finish, the breeze was light again. We worked hard and gybed on every lift. We crossed the line 90 minutes after *High Noon*. We were ecstatic just to arrive not to mention win our class handily. We were hopeful to take the St David's Lighthouse Trophy but had to wait more than a day as the rest of the fleet came in on a freshening breeze. We were pleased to correct 2 hours in front of *High Noon* but will forever consider the performance of *High Noon*'s American Yacht Club juniors to be remarkable and the greatest story of the 2016 Newport Bermuda Race. Though we did have aboard our own junior, my son, Joost-Olan Sheehan. Joost proudly wears his Stephens Brother's society pin to this day.

We'd accomplished so much but our 2016 goal was to win the Northern Ocean Racing Trophy. Despite our 1st overall in the Bermuda Race and 4th overall in the Block Island Race, we were sitting in 3rd place behind the impressive *High Noon* and *Valkyrie*. It was intense and the closest it has ever been down to the wire.

Finishing 8th overall in IRC in the Vineyard Race we were pleased to cap off our dream season and win the Northern Ocean Racing Trophy.

I'm forever grateful to the crew, my family, and the many contributors who helped our team to complete this storybook season of sailing on *Warrior Won*.

Carina Becker, Junior - Carina grew up sailing out of American Yacht Club and competing in the JSA of LIS circuit in Optis, 420s and Lasers. In 2013, Carina began racing

with the Young American Jr. Big Boat Team sailing the J/105, Young American. This was an amazing resource for inshore sailing and allowed her to



compete in local races and in two J/105 North American Championships, one as the bowman in San Francisco with Paul Beaudin and one as the helmsman in Larchmont NY with an all-junior team. Her first distance race was the 2013 Vineyard Race in which the junior team placed first overall (IRC) sailing the J/122 Patriot. This race opened her eyes to big boat sailing and since then she has completed four Vineyard, two Block Island, two Around Long Island, and two Beach-Point Overnight Races. She has also sailed two Bermuda return deliveries and one Newport Bermuda Race, putting her at 3,800 nautical miles sailed. In the 2016 Newport-Bermuda race, Carina sailed High Noon finishing with Line Honors, first in Class and third overall for the St. David's Lighthouse Trophy. This summer Carina will be coaching junior sailing at Larchmont Yacht Club and will be on the Boston University Sailing Team as she starts college this coming fall.

Richard O'Leary, Junior - Richard started sailing as a toddler out of Bass River in Cape Cod, learning the ropes in Beetle Cats and

Wianno Seniors. At age 8 he started sailing Optimist Dinghies at the American Yacht Club in Rye, New York. The AYC junior sailing program is run by Sailing Director Kevin Broome. After three seasons of Optis Richard moved



on to Pixels for a summer, eventually making his way to Lasers. Richard started sailing J/105s with the American Yacht Club Junior Big Boat Team, following the lead of parent and mentor Peter Becker. The JAYC Big Boat team has given Richard the opportunity to race in many events including the Block Island, Vineyard, and Newport-Bermuda Races. Richard lives in Croton Falls, NY and is currently a senior at North Salem High School. He intends to sail in college.
